Pilgrimage to Edmund Rice

In January 2015 Courtney George, our Senior Coordinator Remote Youth Programs, travelled to Ireland to visit the grave of Edmund Rice, our namesake and inspiration.

Upon arriving in Dublin I grabbed the first person I could and asked, "How do I get to Waterford?"

The response I got was one of confusion: "Why on earth do you want to go to Waterford?"

I politely replied that I was in a rush – explaining my connection with Edmund Rice was not something I had time for.

Whilst visiting Waterford, I had the opportunity to visit the Edmund Rice Chapel which is where Edmund's tomb is located.



This was an opportunity I'll cherish forever because it gave me insight into Edmund Rice, the person.

Seeing his grave made him feel real as I've only ever heard the story. However, with such a short amount of time on my hands I was back in Dublin before I knew it.

Once there, I was able to meet up with Brother Martin O'Flaherty, from the Irish chapter of ERC, for dinner and connect with him.

A particular excerpt

from the Thirty First Congregation Chapter booklet seems to sum up my Irish experience quite nicely: "We explore with fresh enthusiasm... the story of Edmund."

I've returned home with more energy than ever before, ready to continue building what Edmund started so many years ago.

... Even if you were getting sand or paint smeared into your hair and on your face!


